





Coastal Wildlife Habitat Workshop

Wednesday, April 7, 2010 9:00 AM - 3:15 PM

Cape Cod Museum of Natural History Route 6A, Brewster

This workshop will cover the different kinds of wildlife habitat associated with coastal areas: coastal banks, beaches, barrier beaches, wetlands and uplands adjacent to salt marshes. The program will discuss significant wildlife habitat features and ways in which to protect them under the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act Regulations, Massachusetts Endangered Species Act and local by-laws. Focus will be on habitat used by mammals (wild canines), mustelids (river otter, mink, fisher), fall food sources for migrating passerine birds, and important habitat features for migratory shorebirds. The goal is to equip professionals and volunteers with information to help them make more informed decisions about protecting and managing coastal wildlife habitat and species that depend on these areas.

Target Audience: conservation commissions, planning boards, natural resource officers, local and state coastal managers, landscapers, landscape designers, and land managers.
