

Please Don't Feed the Algae

Once upon a time, sixty years ago, eel grass was abundant in Waquoit Bay and other bays around Cape Cod. It was a safe **nursery** for young organisms, a **restaurant** for humans and fish and shellfish, an **anchor** to hold the sediments together, and a **filter** to keep the water clear.

Then, things started to change. More and more humans moved to Cape Cod adding wastewater, fertilizers, and nitrogen compounds from the burning of fossil fuels into the bay fertilizing the algae and causing mats to cover the eel grass. Without sunlight, the eel grass died leaving many organisms without a home and reducing the amount of shellfish in the bay.

You probably know this story. But it doesn't have to have a sad ending. Each month we'll bring in a **guest speaker with information on practical actions**, share a tidbit of WBNERR **research** that shows how our actions connect us to the bay as well as examples of how the **Reserve is "walking the walk**" for that topic and end the evening with a **hands-on component**.
