Wild Cape Cod Lectures

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The Turtle Whisperer-Live! Wednesday, July 11 – 7:30 pm

Turtles and tortoises have existed relatively unchanged for nearly 215 million years, yet the world's 300 species of Chelonians are arguably the most endangered vertebrates on Earth! Herpetologist Ian Ives will focus on the turtles of Cape Cod (with living examples).

The Elusive Fisher Cat (not really a cat!) Wednesday, July 18 – 7:30 pm The Fisher is actually Cape Cod's newest weasel and fascinating predator. We will watch video of an orphaned young Fisher learning through trial and error and look at the habits and signs of its Cape Cod relatives such as otters and mink.

How Could A Dachshund Descend From A Wolf? Wednesday, July 25 - 7:30 pm

Biologist Hillary Cressey explores the canine mystery of how our diverse dog breeds developed. Discover the remarkable genetic process that led to poodles and pugs and how today's geneticists can determine your own dog's background.

Great and White - Herons and Egrets Wednesday, August 1 - 7:30 pm

The Great Blue Heron, famous for its S-shaped neck in flight, strikes its prey like lightning at the water's edge. The Great White Egret is actually a heron! Dr. Katharine Parsons, Director of Mass Audubon's Coastal Waterbird Program, will discuss conservation of herons and egrets in Massachusetts and explore factors that have led to declines or increases in species of these spectacular, long-legged wading birds.

From Whaling to Whale Watching Wednesday, August 8 – 7:30 pm Discover the fascinating history of whaling and whale watching in New England and how attitudes towards whales have changed over the years with Regina Asmutis-Silvia, Whale & Dolphin Conservation Society and Heather Rockwell, Cetacean Society International.

Kestrels and Cranberries (live bird) Wednesday, August 15th—7:30 pm

Joey Mason will share her extensive research with American Kestrels in southeastern Massachusetts during the past 23 years. She will describe how she monitors the nest boxes and what has been found, including things which were not kestrels. She will present evidence about what these raptors eat and why they often prefer to nest in cranberry bog habitats. These small falcons are in a rapid population decline. She also will touch on some raptor projects to prevent birds of prey from being killed or injured by manmade structures.
