He has published seven books of essays and is co-editor of <u>The Norton Book of Nature Writing.</u> His most recent book is <u>A Cape Cod Notebook</u>, a collection of his weekly radio commentaries that have been broadcast for the past six years on WCAI, and for which he has twice received the prestigious Edward R. Murrow Award for Radio Writing in 2005 and 2013. For his body of work he was named as one of the New England Literary Lights for 1999 by the Associates of the Boston Public Library, and in 2001 he received the Non-Fiction Award from the New England Booksellers Association.
