

# **Sea Level Rise, Storms and Cape Cod**

#### Two workshops focused on reducing risk and improving regional preparedness

Increased storminess and flooding events over recent years have continued to expose Cape Cod's vulnerability to storms and sea level rise and the type of impacts these hazards can have on the landscape and the economy. This, coupled with projections for more intense storms and greater sea level rise in the future, make it imperative for communities to enhance how they prepare for these threats.

### Developing Planning and Decision-Support Tools to Meet Local Needs

Thursday, March 12, 2015 9:00AM - 4:30PM

Workshop I will focus on examining existing web-based mapping and visualization tools that can inform local planning and emergency response efforts and ways to enhance their utility. It will incorporate tools and planning processes that are being effectively used in New Jersey communities affected by Super Storm Sandy to strengthen resiliency planning and identify elements that may be transferable to Cape Cod. Through a blend of presentations, interactive demonstration, and discussion, the workshop will allow participants to contribute concrete ideas on ways to enhance mapping tools to make them as useful as possible to local decision-makers. Recognizing that mapping tools on their own are insufficient to achieve resiliency goals, the workshop will also provide a forum to highlight opportunities and collaborative action necessary to continue making progress towards a more resilient Cape Cod.
