She is the author of four books on the maritime trade between New England and the North Pacific, including the award-winning *Devil on the Deep Blue Sea: The Notorious Career of Samuel Hill of Boston*, and three novels. Mary teaches in the Museum Studies program at Harvard University and is currently writing a book on the history of museums.
